of Herold's handwriting.

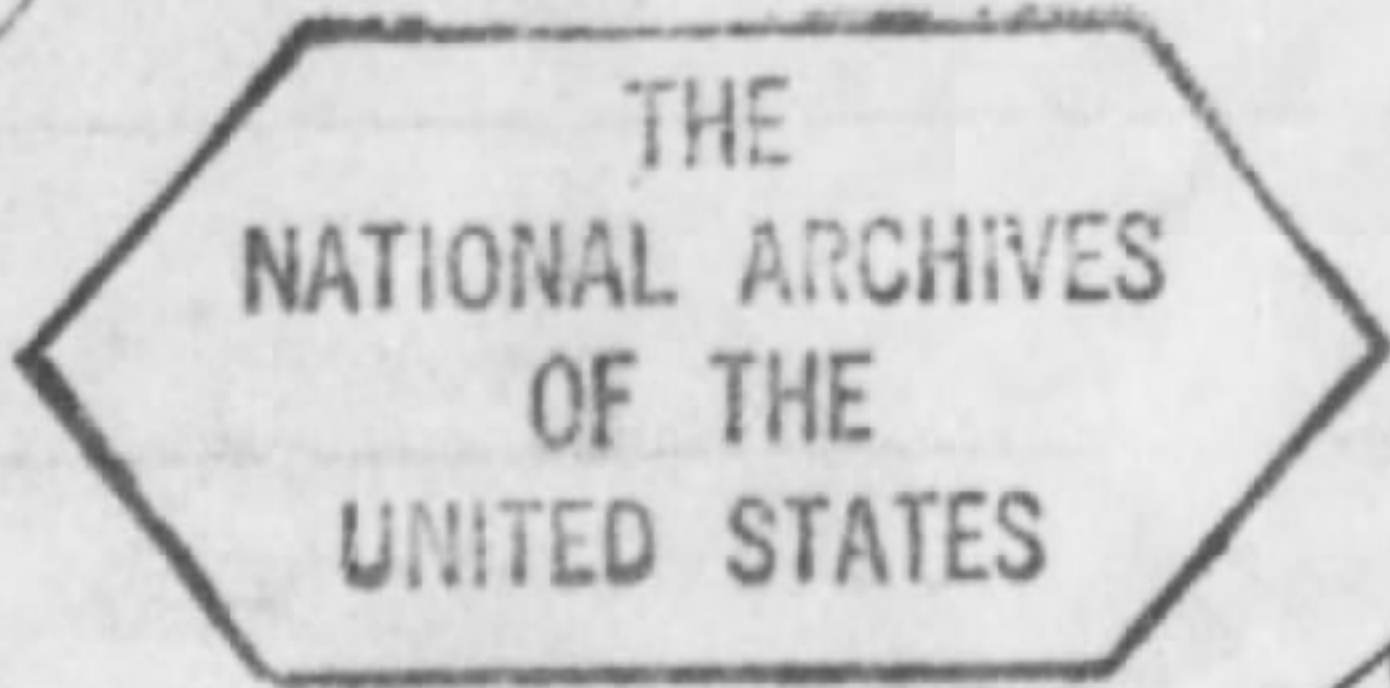

The above were in the habit of hunting with  
David C. Herold.

They frequently went to  
Gurch's (who has a tavern now at Annapolis)  
Hard's  
Jenkins's

which are east of the Capitol.

French Queen saw Herold and Surratt  
4 1/2 P.M. Apr 14th '65 on horseback, coming from the  
vicinity of Herold's house and going towards the city.

Previously Herold and a man named Golan, dressed like a farmer, had oysters at Steel's Saloon corner of 5th St and St, near the Navy Yard: this was the same day. Golan had been seen in Herold's company three days previous.

14th April 65

From the son of J. Walsh, Druggist, 8th St.

Officer Rosch learned that Herold had sympathized with the South, but young Walsh declines to repeat the expressions which Herold used.

At Topis Stable, a colored boy said that Herold purchased a pony Aug 64 and sold it about Nov 14. 65. - to whom the boy does not know though he could identify them.
